Loggers arrive in Aani's village to cut down a nearby forest that the community relies on for fuel and the fauna rely on for shelter. In a bold act of passive resistance, Aani and her friends cause the developers to rethink their plans.
Abel's Island	Steig, William	One summer day, newlywed mice Abel and Amanda are out for a picnic in the woods when they are caught in a sudden storm—a "full-fledged, screaming hurricane" to be precise. As they take refuge in a cave, a wind scoops up Amanda's scarf, and Abel foolishly lunges from safety to retrieve it. So begins the ensuing adventures of this rather foppish mouse as he comes head to head with nature. A Newbery Honor Book.

Acquaintance with Darkness, An	Rinaldi, Ann	Like many of Ann Rinaldi's wonderful historical novels, this book takes a defining moment in American history and makes it accessible to students. This story uses the assassination of Abraham Lincoln as a way to help students solve a mystery and explore the tumultuous political times of post-Civil War life.
Across Five Aprils	Hunt, Irene	A critic maintains: "Brilliant characterization, a telling sense of story, an uncanny ability to balance fact and fiction, and compassionate, graceful writing mark Hunt's small but distinguished body of work." With Across Five Aprils, Hunt established herself as one of the greatest historical novelists, proving that she can write for both adult and children audiences. Adam and the Road	Vining, Elizabeth Gray	The adventures of eleven-year-old Adam as he travels the open roads of thirteenth-century England searching for his missing father, a minstrel, and his stolen red spaniel, Nick. Along the way he encounters rich merchants, priests, farmers, and thieves.
Adventures of Tom Sawyer	Twain	In The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, Twain recalls his own boyhood experiences and those of his schoolmates—a humorous perspective of carefree days.
African Mask, The	Rupert, Janet E	Rupert has modeled an imaginative tale set in the city-state of Ife 900 years ago. Layo, a 12-year-old Yoruba girl, comes from a village of potters. Exceptionally talented, she longs to be able to work the clay as her elders do and to be feed from the menial, apprentice-like tasks that young women must perform. She is concerned not only with how to use her growing abilities in spite of the restraints place on her by her age, but also faces the prospect of betrothal. When she travels to Ife to live and work with her grandmother, a potter of legendary ability, she faces challenges that test her as a person. The author is careful to stay true to her protagonist's rich culture, depicting its treatment of women, family structure, deep respect for crafts and craftspeople, business acumen, religious beliefs, and complex system of slavery. Readers will not only find this novel enjoyable, but will also come away from it with a greater knowledge of the Yoruba.

All Quiet on the Western Front	Remarque, Erich Mari	Paul Baumer enlisted with his classmates in the German army of World War I. Youthful, enthusiastic, they become soldiers. But despite what they have learned, they break into pieces under the first bombardment in the trenches. And as horrible war plods on year after year, Paul holds fast to a single vow: to fight against the principles of hate that meaninglessly pits young men of the same generation but different uniforms against each other -if only he can come out of the war alive. Almost Starring Skinnybones	Park	Irrepressible twelve-year-old Alex is convinced that he will be a star and impress his schoolmates when, as the winner of a cat food essay contest, he is asked to make a commercial for national television.
Among the Hidden	Haddix	In a future where the Population Police enforce the law limiting a family to only two children, Luke has lived all his twelve years in isolation and fear on his family's farm, until another "third" convinces him that the government is wrong.
Amos Fortune	Yates, Elizabeth	Amos, born the son of a king of Africa, was fifteen years old when he was captured by slave traders and brought to Massachusetts. Although his freedom was taken he never lost his dignity, courage, dream of being free, and some day buying his freedom.
Anklet for a Princess: A Cinderella Story from India	Brucker, Meredith Babeaux	Believed to have been preserved in India's oral tradition for 1,000 years, this Cinderella story is complete with a hungry, ragged girl, a kindly Godfather who bestows sparkling gifts and a handsome prince.
Anne of Green Gables	Montgomery	Anne, an eleven-year-old orphan, is sent by mistake to live with a lonely, middle-aged brother and sister on a Prince Edward Island farm and proceeds to make an indelible impression on everyone around her.
Anthony & Cleopatra	Shakespeare	A very involved tragedy which embodies the love story of its characters and has rapid shifts in geographical locations. Cleopatra is considered one of Shakespeare's more complex female characters. It contains very descriptive language and the use of hyperbole is quite evident.
April Morning	Fast, Howard	This book tells the story of a teenage boy named Adam Cooper, and his involvement in the battle of Lexington. At first no one in the village of Lexington believes that the British are coming to fight. But when they kill Adam's father and many of his friends, he flees. After he has gained control of himself, he goes out with his cousin and helps win one of the most famous battles during the American Revolution.
Around the World in 80 Days	Verne, Jules	The eccentric English gentleman Phileas Fogg accepts a challenge to circle the globe in no more than 80 days—an incredible feat for the Victorian age. Exotic locales, seemingly insurmountable obstacles, and comic relief (chiefly supplied by Fogg's loyal valet, Passepartout) provide a fantastic blend of adventure, entertainment, and suspense.
Atalanta and the Arcadian Beast	Yolen, Jane	The story of Atalanta, a young orphan raised by bears in the woods of Arcadia. Her quiet life in the woods is interrupted when a beast begins to terrorize the countryside. Atlanta proves herself as a warrior and valued member of society while learning a lot about life and her own destiny.
Autobiography of Martin Luther King Jr., The	King	He was a husband, a father, a preacher – the preeminent leader of a movement that continues to transform America and the world. Martin Luther King, Jr., was one of the twentieth century's most influential men and lived one of its most extraordinary lives. Now, in a special volume commissioned and authorized by his family, here is the life and times of Martin Luther King, Jr., drawn from a comprehensive collection of writings, recordings, and documentary materials, many of which have never before been made public.

That is, until Naomi and Owen's mother reappears after seven years, stirring up all sorts of questions—and a whole lot of trouble. Beowulf		This is the longest surviving Anglo-Saxon epic poem set in the sixth century of what is now Denmark and southwestern Sweden. It tells the story of a lonely and isolated hero who comes to save a kingdom from a monster Grendel. Both pagan and Christian elements are present in a section of the poem. Violence
Big Wave, The	Buck, Pearl S.	This is a story about Kino who lives on a farm on a mountainside in Japan and his friend Jiya who lives in the fishing village on the beach. When a big wave hits and Jiya loses his family he must learn to overcome his sorrow and appreciate life.
Bless the Beasts and the Children	Swarthout	They were the castaway offspring of parents who were too busy. They were rejects until Cotton pulled them together on a fantastic mission to strike one final blow in the battle to save themselves.
Blubber	Blume, Judy	When overweight Linda gives an oral report on whales, the cruel and power-wielding class leader, Wendy, starts calling her "Blubber." The name-calling escalates into more intense bullying and humiliation. The novel's narrator, Jill, is a full participant from the start. Over time, though, she comes to question everyone's behavior, including her own. Finally, she challenges Wendy's power and learns that there are consequences, as well as rewards, to taking a stand.
Blue Heron	Avi	While spending the month of August on the Massachusetts shore with her father, stepmother, and their new baby, almost thirteen-year-old Maggie finds beauty in and draws strength from a great blue heron, even as the family around her unravels.

Bone from a Dry Sea, A	Dickinson, Peter	There are really two parallel stories told in this book, and they are separated by a couple of million years. In the present, a young teenager named Vinny has convinced her mother to let her spend summer vacation with her father in Africa. Her father, Sam, is working in an archeological site in Africa without much success. Vinny turns out to be his good luck charm. Flip back to the past and we see a teenager called Li that is half-ape, half-human that thinks way beyond her time. Each chapter goes back and forth between past and present.
Bone Wars, The	Lasky, Kathryn	This sweeping historical adventure deals with an action-packed period of American history—the late 1800s in the Badlands of Montana. It is a period which includes legendary historical figures, a period of Indian heroes, and a period of discoveries of gold and scientific treasures. All of this is woven together with the story of two lonely teenagers from totally different cultures and social backgrounds who are caught up in the turmoil of the times and whose ideas of fairness bring them together.
Breadwinner, The	Ellis, Deborah	Imagine living in a country in which women and girls are not allowed to leave the house without a man. Imagine having to wear clothes that cover every part of your body, including your face, whenever you go out. This is life in Afghanistan, where the Taliban, members of an extreme religious group, run most of the country.
Brian's Winter	Paulsen	Instead of being rescued from a plane crash, as in the author's book Hatchet, this story portrays what would have happened to Brian had he been forced to survive a winter in the wilderness with only his survival pack and hatchet.
Bridge to Terabithia	Paterson, Katherine	Jess Aarons' greatest ambition is to be the fastest runner in the fifth grade. He's been practicing all summer and can't wait to see his classmates' faces when he beats them all. But on the first day of school, a new kid, a new girl, boldly crosses over to the boys' side of the playground and outruns everyone.
Bronze Bow, The	Speare, Elizabeth George	The scene is Jerusalem at the time of Christ, the characters vividly real, the story gripping. After witnessing his father's crucifixion by the Roman soldiers, hatred and revenge consume Daniel. He continually hears of the teachings of Jesus as well as the pull of caring for a disturbed sister.
Bud, not Buddy	Speare	Ten-year-old Bud, a motherless boy living in Flint, Michigan, during the Great Depression, escapes a bad foster home and sets out in search of the man he believes to be his father—the renowned bandleader, H.E. Calloway of Grand Rapids.
Burger Wuss	Anderson	Hoping to lose his loser image, Anthony plans revenge on a bully, which results in a war between two competing fast-food restaurants, Burger Queen and O'Dermott's
Cages	Kehret	After losing an acting role and fighting with her alcoholic stepfather, Kit is arrested for shoplifting and ordered to work as part of her sentence at an animal shelter.
Call it Courage	Sperry	This is the inspiring story of a youth who overcomes his fear of the sea and proves his courage to himself and his tribe.
Call of the Wild, The	London, Jack	First published in 1903, The Call of the Wild is regarded as Jack London's masterpiece. Based on London's experiences as a gold prospector in the Canadian wilderness and his ideas about nature and the struggle for existence, The Call of the Wild is a tale about unbreakable spirit and the fight for survival in the frozen Alaskan Klondike. This story has some scenes of dogs fighting and people being cruel to the dogs.

Can of Worms	Mackel	Bullied and unhappy at school, thirteen-year-old Mike, who has always thought that he might be an alien, sends a distress call into space asking to be rescued from the ignorance and cruelty of his life on Earth.
Canterbury Tales, The	Chaucer, Geoffrey	Written in Middle English, this is a collection of stories written in the fourteenth century and told by a crowd of pilgrims on their way to visit a shrine at Canterbury Cathedral. The tales are considered one of the most influential works in Western literature. May have offensive material for some.
Captive, The	O'Dell, Scott	As part of a Spanish expedition to the New World, a Jesuit seminarian witnesses the enslavement and exploitation of the Mayas and his own seduction by greed and ambition.
Catherine Called Birdy	Cushman, Karen	Catherine, the spirited daughter of English knight, keeps a journal of her life as a young girl in Medieval England. She recounts her tale of a typical life a fourteen year old in 1290. Her stories of the mundane house life are supplemented with tales of love, would be marriage, religion, and home remedies.
Cay, The	Taylor, Theodore	Philip, and a boat hand, Timothy, get stranded on an island when their ship, the Hato, is sunk by a torpedo. Philip and the old man don't get along but they must find a way to work together to survive.
Chain of Fire	Naidoo, Beverly	The South African government is forcing Naledi and the other villagers to move to a new location: a "homeland" of iron huts and barren soil. And it seems that no one is willing to resist. No one, that is, except Naledi's friend Taolo, whose family has often spoken out against apartheid. Taolo gives Naledi the strength to fight, and with his help, she and her schoolmates organize an anti-removal march through the village. Come Morning	Guccione, Leslie Davis	Freedom Newcastle, 12, knows his father, Nehemiah, is a conductor on the Underground Railroad. He wants to be included in the clandestine activities, but is told over and over, "ignorance'll keep you safe." Then, when the man is arrested by patrollers, Free must accept responsibility for leading a family of runaway slaves to safety and he realizes that he has romanticized Nehemiah's involvement. As he leads this family to the next station, he realizes how courageous his father is and grows to respect the abolitionists' commitment to freedom for all people. This is a fast-moving book with excellent characterization. The story is based on fact and will be useful to students studying the Civil War era. Gr 4-7
Conch Bearer, The	Banerjee, Divakaruni Chitra	In India, twelve year old Anand is given a magical conch shell to protect from people who want to use the shell for evil. He goes on a journey and learns the true meaning of "magic" along the way.
Coraline	Gaiman	Looking for excitement, Coraline ventures through a mysterious door into a world that is similar, yet disturbingly different from her own, where she must challenge a gruesome entity in order to save herself, her parents, and the souls of three others.
Corn Grows Ripe, The	Rhoades, Dorothy	Twelve year old Tigre a Mayan boy has to shoulder the work or harvesting and planting when his father is injured in an accident.
Corn Raid: A Story of the Jamestown Settlement	Collier, James Lincoln	An unlikely friendship between two boys, an indentured servant and a Native American, reveals much about life in colonial American as well as friendships in all times.
Court of the Stone Children	Cameron	Aided by the journal of a young woman who lived in nineteenth-century France, Nina solves a murder mystery dormant since the time of Napoleon.
Cousins	Hamilton	Concerned that her grandmother may die, Cammy is overwhelmed by the accidental death of another relative.

Crispin and the Cross of Lead	Avi	Crispin, an orphan in fourteenth century Medieval England tries to escape the men who want him dead for a crime he did not commit. On his journey he befriends Bear, a minstrel who teaches him the trade, and find out the real reason the men want him dead; his noble blood.
Crossing, The	Paulsen, Gary	Manny Bustos is an orphan, scrabbling for survival on the streets of Juárez, Mexico. He sleeps in a cardboard box and fights with boys bigger and older than him for the coins American tourists through off the bridge between El Paso, Texas, and his town. Across the border, Sergeant Robert S. Locke, Vietnam vet and Army prefect, searches for a way to forget the painful memories. On the night Manny dares the crossing, through the muddy shallows of the Rio Grande, past searchlights and border patrol, in the hopes of a better life, the two meet in an explosive encounter that fills the night with tension and endless possibilities.

Growing up and becoming a man while being the only boy in his family, Robert’s father says it is his last winter and Robert must learn the ways of the farm. Deep-Sea Explorer: The Story of Robert Ballard Discoverer of the Titanic	Archbold, Rick	This is a readable, exciting portrait of the scientist/explorer who discovered the Titanic, the Bismarck, and shipwrecks from the Battle of Guadalcanal. The book chronicles Ballard’s childhood in San Diego, describing both his early fascination with the sea and his strong family relationships. Ballard’s academic and research failures, as well as his successes are described, and his refusal to give up in the face of personal trauma. Ballard’s initial scientific work—seeking evidence of plate tectonic activity on the ocean floor—was not enough for the intensely driven and creative man. His desire for new frontiers led him into deep-sea exploration and the discoveries of famous shipwrecks. Illustrated with underwater photographs.

Family Apart	Nixon	When their mother can no longer support them, six siblings are sent by the Children's Aid Society of New York City to live with farm families in Missouri in 1860.
Farm Team	Weaver	With his father in jail and his mother working full-time, fourteen-year-old Billy Baggs finds himself in charge of running the family farm in northern Minnesota and having to give up the thing he loves most—baseball.
Fifth of March, The	Rinaldi, Ann	The story of Rachel Marsh, an indentured servant during the American Revolution, and her search for her place in this emerging nation lives in the house of John Adams and meets Revolutionary figures and witnesses the Boston Massacre.
Fight for Life	Anderson	With the help of her veterinarian grandmother and the other volunteers at the Wild at Heart Animal Clinic, eleven-year-old Maggie rescues sick puppies from an illegal puppy mill.

There she is given the task of restoring the historical pictures sewn on the robe worn at the annual Ruin Song Gathering, a solemn day-long performance of the story of their world's past. Down the hall lives Thomas the Carver, a young boy who works on the intricate symbols carved on the Singer's staff, and a tiny girl who is being trained as the next Singer. Over the three artists hovers the menace of authority, seemingly kind but suffocating to their creativity, and the dark secret at the heart of the Ruin Song. This inspirational story about the value of education is based on the childhood experiences of a woman who went on to become a teacher.
Giver, The	Lowry, Lois	Jonas lives in a perfect world. There is no war, no poverty, and no choices. When Jonas turns twelve he is singled out to receive special training to hold the memories: memories of war, of pain, of color, of choices.
Golden Goblet, The	McGraw, Eloise Jarvis	Ranofer, a young Egyptian who longs to be a goldsmith, discovers that his evil half brother is a thief and sets out on an adventure to prove his brother's guilt.
Great Expectations	Dickens, Charles	The protagonist Pip is led into making grave mistakes based on several false expectations. Through suffering and disappointment, he eventually realizes his true self-worth and lives a fulfilling life.
Great Fire	Murphy	Thirty-one hours of terror, over 100,000 people were forced to flee the flames. You will meet some of the people who were there and learn more about the Great Fire of Chicago on October 8, 1871.
Group of One, A	Gilmore, Rachna	Just trying to fit in as a "regular Canadian," Tara is the daughter of Indian immigrants. When her grandmother tells her the story of the family's role in the Quit India movement of 1942, Tara claims her ancestral history and reassesses personal assumptions.
Hamlet	Shakespeare	This is a tragedy involving the unyielding hunt by a prince for his father's murderer. Many powerful confrontations occur within this tragedy and during, prior to, and after these exchanges, one explores the depths of human emotion. May have offensive material.

However, when a wizard comes to visit Bilbo's adventure is on the menu. This book is about the adventures of a very surprising hobbit and includes dragons, dwarfs, orcs, and a mysterious ring.
Holes	Sachar, Louis	If you take a bad boy and make him dig a hole every day in the hot sun, it will turn him into a good boy. Such is the reigning philosophy at Camp Green Lake, a juvenile detention facility where there is no lake, and there are no happy campers. I Rode a Horse of Milk White Jade	D. Wilson	Oyuna tells her granddaughter the story of how love for her horse enabled her to win a race and bring good luck to her family living in Mongolia in the time of Kublai Khan.
In the Year of the Boar and Jackie Robinson	Lord	In 1947, a Chinese child comes to Brooklyn, where she starts to feel at home and makes friends when she discovers baseball and the Brooklyn Dodgers.
Inside the Walls of Troy	McLaren, Clemence	Unfortunately for Helen, she's the most beautiful woman in the world. Not that she cares about her beauty; she'd rather be riding horses. But lots of other people do care, especially men. King Theseus steals her away from her family. Golding's gripping novel explores the boundary between human reason and animal instinct, all on the brutal playing field of adolescent competition. This book may contains violence.
Lyddie	Paterson	Impoverished Vermont farm girl Lyddie Worthen is determined to gain her independence by becoming a factory worker in Lowell, Massachusetts in the 1840s.
Macbeth	Shakespeare	This tragedy opens with the sight of witches finishing a cabal and moves deeper into chaos, "fog and filthy air," murder, and dark mystery. Events transpire faster than the mind can conceive as Macbeth seizes power only to be destroyed by his blind ambition. Note: This play may contain offensive material.

In one of the funniest scenes, cunning Imogene Herdman comes to the rescue of a boy whose head (thanks to Imogene's brother) is stuck in a bike rack: she flattens his prominent ears with Scotch tape and slathers his head with margarine so it
