Olympic View Elementary houses approximately 490 students. Built in 1962, its classrooms are more spacious than current building codes demand.

This school accommodates a cultural and economic diversity truly representative of America. On a daily basis, students with similar reading abilities meet in small groups for 90 minutes of learning. Students who need that extra boost are given one-on-one tutoring
